## Repeated Calls to 311 Gets Results

When the weeds in the abandoned lot at 11812 Lexington NE got up to 5 feet, the city decided to step in and take them down to bare earth. When it was pointed out that the city could become liable for injuries to those who were taking the lot as a shortcut to the arroyo, they weighed their options and sent a crew to the property to cut all the weeds down. This is the same property where the elderly owner died in a fire in 2013.

The city has failed to recognize that the back wall that borders on the arroyo is a safety hazard for the many youngsters to take that shortcut to the arroyo. Vandals destroyed the wall in 2015 and were caught on surveillance video, but APD declined to view the video or even file a report.

### Persistence Does Pay: Candelaria Being Repaired

The intersection of Chelwood Park and Candelaria, which has long been a hazardous stop due to poor maintenance and poor design, is finally being repaired. The city cannot afford to change the design of the approaches to the intersection, but the Road Department is milling down the huge bumps in the asphalt surface and will be resurfacing the intersection. Drivers have reported losing control of their vehicles, particularly when the surface is wet or when a thin layer of ice covers the pavement. Rapidly approaching the intersection also causes loss of control. Braking under those conditions has been especially dangerous. The Safety Inspector agreed that this intersection has been a hazard for several years.

## **Medicaid Is Not Free**

Federal law requires that the cost of long-term medical care be repaid from the estates of certain Medicaid recipients. If the Medicaid recipient is 55 years of age or older when receiving Medicaid support for long-term services, the recipient's estate (the property that is left after the recipient's death) will be used to pay the State of New Mexico back any money that was spent on the Medicaid recipient's care. These costs can include: nursing home care, in-home or community-based services, doctor services, hospital expenses and prescription drugs.

#### WHY:

Because the State of New Mexico receives federal AND state tax funding for its Medicaid program, the federal government's Estate Recovery Law (42 U.S.C. § 1396P (B)(4)(A)) requires the state to attempt this recovery. State Statutes: the Medicaid Estate Recovery Law can be found in Chapter 27, Article 2A; and the Uniform Probate Code can be found in Chapter 45. For more information:

- The city will replace or repair a damaged garbage bin. Call 311
- ALL VETS AND SURVIVING SPOUSES OF VETS The state constitution was revised in 2004 that allows <u>all</u> veterans and their spouses to claim the veteran's exemption on their property tax. The wartime service requirement has been removed. This could reduce your assessed value by up to \$4000. Call toll-free 866-433-8387 to contact the NM Veterans Service Commission for further information.
- Pet owners: Please take some time to clean up after your pets. Residents are reporting animal feces are littering the sidewalks and yards. This is a very serious health hazard. Our new Pet Waste Station is up and operating at the east end of Ross Enchanted Park.
- The Solid Waste Department requests that customers separate multiple bins, i.e., the black and blue bins from each other by a minimum of 3 feet at the curb to allow sufficient room to operate the mechanical arms on the trucks. Failure to keep this distance could result in your bins being overturned as the truck pulls away.
- APDs Jill Garcia suggests that you keep a watch on your neighbors' garage doors and alert your neighbor if it is open or ajar. The open garage door is the one of the easiest entries to your home.

### **Neighborhood Volunteers**

EPNA has routinely enlisted the assistance of neighborhood volunteers who deliver this Newsletter to each address wishing to receive it in hard copy form. Initially, we have tried to assign only one street to each volunteer to keep the individual load low for each volunteer. Over the years, our list of volunteers has slowly dwindled to the point where several volunteers have indicated they could handle more than one street. With 16 streets within EPNA, it is a considerable task to deliver each newsletter to the entire neighborhood. The total each quarter is 675 double-sided copies.

We ask our volunteers to respect those neighbors who do not wish to receive the newsletter in hard copy form. That option is spelled out in the membership form. Walking the delivery route is also an opportunity to identify any hazards that might affect your neighbors safety, such as broken water meter covers, rocks or glass in the street, etc. We encourage our volunteers to report these to 311 or to one of our EPNA officers or directors.

Several volunteers have agreed to deliver to multiple streets when others have become ill or are otherwise unable to deliver the newsletters for their street. If you have some spare time to help deliver the EPNA newsletters for a single street every three months, please contact Bob Trudo at 299-6449. An average street consisting of about 35-40 residences takes about 30-40 minutes to deliver the newsletters. This issue is typical. If you are unable to deliver to your assigned street, please call Bob Trudo at 299-6449 so he can locate an alternate volunteer.
